

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

I am pleased to present this inaugural Annual Report for the L.E.W. Carty Charitable Fund. The production of this Report has provided an occasion for the Trustees to look back at our achievements and celebrate our successes.

February 2016 marked the 36th anniversary of the establishment of the L.E.W. Carty Charitable Fund by its founder Olive Muriel Carty to honour the memory of her late husband Leslie Ernest William Carty. Mrs Carty passed away on 26 February 1977 and her bequest of \$200,000 was made to the Trustees on 20 February 1980, with power of accumulation of income for 21 years in accordance with the terms of Mrs Carty's will.

In the intervening years and with prudent monitoring and management, the L.E.W. Carty Charitable Fund has grown from its modest beginnings to a corpus of some \$7m. Each year, grants are made from the income earned. As the value of the corpus has grown, the amount of money available for distribution has also grown.

Since the first small grant of \$2,000 was made in 1981, we have awarded 160 grants totalling \$7.025m. We have partnered with visionary medical research organisations situated in Victoria that assist or promote medical research into the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of human disease.

As Trustees, we are proud of the indirect impact the L.E.W. Carty Charitable Fund has had on the lives and health outcomes of so many people through the Fund's support for medical research. The research projects which have been funded over the years are many and varied. Medical research has advanced considerably since Mrs Carty established the foundation. In 2016, two grants totalling \$280,000 were made to projects which would have been only in the realm of the imagination in 1977 at the time of her death. These projects are profiled within this annual report.

In her life, Olive Carty was a woman of independent means when at the age of thirty she married fifty year old widower Leslie Carty, commonly known as Lew from the initials of his given names. Sadly, they only had a few years together before he passed away from cancer. Olive determined she would use the inheritance her husband left her to establish under her own will a philanthropic fund to benefit Victorian medical research institutions, and name it in honour of Lew. In its fourth decade, we seek to expand the spirit of Olive Carty's philanthropy and support 21st century medical research which will lead to improved health outcomes for all.

OUR GRANTMAKING CHARTER

- To distribute grants in accordance with the terms of the Will of the late Olive Muriel Carty to honour the memory of her late husband Leslie Ernest William Carty. The L.E.W. Carty Charitable Fund makes grants to authorised charities within the State of Victoria, being a hospital, institution, society, organisation, body or fund, that are in need of funds to assist or promote research into the diagnosis, prevention or treatment of physical or mental disorders of human beings.
- To select grants to appropriate charities at the absolute discretion of the Board of Trustees.
- To act in all of its dealings as an independent, non-politically aligned entity.

OUR GRANTMAKING GOALS

Immediate research needs

Immediate research needs of research institutions in relation to essential items of equipment and areas of research into the diagnosis, prevention, or treatment of physical or mental disorders of human beings.

Longer-term research needs

Supporting future world-class research in Victoria through the nurturing and retention of key researchers situated in Victoria.

Australian College of Optometry

Generating the next generation of bionic eyes

\$180,000 over three years


The Australian College of Optometry was founded in 1939 and undertakes research through the National Vision Research Institute which was established in 1972. The NVRI is dedicated to research aimed at better understanding the complexities of vision and its disorders. Its goals include preventing blindness and restoring sight by conducting basic science, translational and clinical research.

In 2016, the L.E.W. Carty Charitable Fund provided a partnership grant to enable the establishment of a new postdoctoral research fellowship. The grant of \$180,000 was made on the proviso that a cofunder would be sought to match the gift. In May 2016, the Australian College of Optometry announced that the L.E.W. Carty Charitable Fund and the Victorian Lions Foundation would jointly fund the new post-doctoral research fellowship at the National Vision Research Institute.

Dr Molis Yunzab was appointed to be the new L.E.W. Carty-Lions Victoria Research Fellow. She will work with Professor Michael Ibbotson at the National Vision Research Institute to design the next generation of bionic eye devices and investigate taking visual prosthetics (bionic eyes) from the current prototype stage to something offering true functional vision, where wide-field images can be formed. This will allow a profoundly blind person to experience a more independent quality of life.

Walter and Eliza Hall Institute of Medical Research

L.E.W. Carty Centenary Fellowship for Cancer Research - Third Year \$100,000

The Walter and Eliza Hall Institute of Medical Research (WEHI) is Australia's oldest medical research institute. Established in 1915, its scientists have been making significant discoveries in immunity, cancer, and infectious diseases. These discoveries have advanced understanding of human biology and resulted in new and more effective treatments for patients worldwide.

Dr Leigh Coultas is the L.E.W. Carty Centenary Fellow. He is investigating the molecular regulation of blood vessel growth and development – a process termed angiogenesis.

Blood vessel networks are essential for distributing blood and nutrients throughout the body. As a tissue grows, its metabolic needs increase and the blood vessel network servicing this tissue must expand to meet these needs. Angiogenesis expands the blood vessel network from just a few millimeters in length in early foetal life to an estimated 100,000 km in length by adulthood, demonstrating its importance in growing new blood vessels. Under normal circumstances, angiogenesis occurs predominantly during foetal life and is uncommon in adults. However, angiogenesis can be inappropriately activated, and this can cause or contribute to a range of diseases such as cancer, diabetic retinopathy and age-related macular degeneration.

There have been significant recent advances in our understanding of angiogenesis, yet much remains unknown about how this highly complex process works. Leigh has made some notable discoveries in the course of his research which will significantly increase our understanding of cancer in several ways, and he will continue his valuable research under the L.E.W. Carty Centenary Fellowship.
